The Christchurch-Little River Rail Trail
29 March 2009

Time: Approx 4 hours
Start: 9:30am at Motukarara
Finish: Little River Domain for Picnic Lunch

The first section of the 44 km-long Christchurch-Little River Rail Trail stretches between Motukarara and Catons Bay, near Little River and covers 21 km. It was the first section to be opened to the public in 2006 after the railway closed in 1962.

The line was originally initiated in 1876 to transport timber from the numerous mills in the region, Many of the Libeau Descendants have links with this area, reclaiming the land to farm, milling and working on the punts that transported the timber out across both Lake Forsythe and Lake Ellesmere.

View the trail with Ian Hall from the Department of Conservation and gather for a family picnic at Little River Domain.

Ian will meet us at 9:30am at Motukarara and guide us along the trail stopping at 4 strategic points. The longest stop will be approximately $\frac{3}{4}$ of an hour. For those who travel by car it will be necessary to stay as a group, taking care as we move off the Main Akaroa Highway to follow the line.

For the more adventurous there is time to bike the trail and meet up with the vehicles at the four stops. However, if you simply wish to take the opportunity to bike and meet up at Little River that is just fine. The cycle trail finishes opposite the old Little River Railway Station.

Behind the station is a larger car park for those wishing to collect family members and uplift bikes before heading to the Domain. This is safer than stopping along the Main Highway.

There will be a briefing before we leave on the journey to confirm numbers on the trip, discuss meeting points, issue maps etc. There is an excellent booklet published by the Ministry of the Environment at a cost of \$5.00 and available at DOC Centres.

The activity is planned to cover all ages. Those who wish to explore this part of the Peninsula, those who wish to experience the cycle trail and those who simple want to have a family day out.

- Will continue with Family based workshops (April was the de Malmanche family, November is the Breitmeyer Family) as well as other topic based workshops.
- Both Peter and John travel to Akaroa to attend the French Fest organising Committee. The Group is responsible for the Parade.
- Two further trees have been planted in the Akaroa Heritage Park.

Both Leone Fuller and John Coleman are happy to continue to represent the Family at the Comte de Paris Group.

14. Website. Richard Warlow (webmaster for our Site) traced the development of the website to the meeting and then, through a projected image, showed aspects of the web pages, but concentrating on the Members Area. He then explained further aspects being developed and in particular the sites of interest to the Family in Akaroa and France by using the 'Google' facilities.

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CHEVALIER DE L’ORDRE NATIONAL DU MERITE

The National Order of Merit is an order of chivalry awarded by the President of the French Republic. It was founded on December 3, 1963 by President Charles de Gaulle.

The reason for the order’s establishment was to create a distinction which could be awarded to French nationals, men and women, for distinguished civil and military achievements. It can be awarded more liberally than the “ Légion d’honneur” and it replaces the large number of ministerial orders previously awarded by the ministries. The President of the French Republic is the Grand Master of the Order and appoints all other members of the Order, by convention, on the advice of the Government.

The badge of the order is a six-armed “Maltese Cross” in silver, enamelled blue, with laurel leaves between the arms. The central disc features the head of the Marianne, surrounded by the legend “république Francaise”. The reverse central disc has a set of crossed tricolores, surrounded by the name of the order and in turn surrounded by a wreath of laurel.

I received this award for the work I do as the French Honorary Consul and my involvement with the French community in Christchurch , for my work in the development of the French culture and language and my involvement with the Alliance Francaise and finally as a translator for the Police, the Court and the Hospital. I feel very honoured to have received this award and will continue to do my best and share my passion for France.

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White Family Reunion held

Members of the White family, descended from James and Clemence White, held a family reunion in Little River recently, at a time, which roughly marked the centennial of the family’s arrival in the district. James had come from Ballarat in 1904 before making his way to Little River where he married Clemence Clark in 1909. He died in 1967, aged 82, and Clemence died in 1988 at the age of 105. They had 10 children, five of whom attended the gathering – Edna, Lily, Clotilde, Winsom and Douglas. The others, Muriel, Annie, Milton, Delanie and Clemence have died. Clemence White was a grand daughter of Joseph and Magdaleine Libeau, who had arrived in Akaroa on the Comte de Paris in 1840, and James and she were married at the Coach Road property which had been bought by her father in 1885. Activities at the reunion included lunch, photographs, a visit to the Little River cemetery and time spent looking at old photographs and documents.

The AGM was adjourned and continued in Cambridge where the Northern zone of the family live. This gave them an opportunity to contribute to the forward planning. Vaughan, Norman, (our treasurer) and I attended this meeting.

We welcome to the team, Bethel Clarke our historian, Jocelyn Benefield for the Western zone and Kevin Clark who will co-ordinate the Southern Zone.

We could still manage one or two members on our Christchurch committee. If you would like to be included do contact me or one of the committee. Our meeting dates are set. There are 4 during the year and held on a Sunday afternoon at the Alliance Francaise rooms in Hereford Street.

During the coming year there are several events planned. Some include events at Akaroa and other events when families can gather to keep the links.

Summary of Meetings of the Society to July 2008.

An account for some accommodation in Rochefort has still not been received. Contact has been made with the Information Office in Rochefort and our French Family to resolve the situation.

- It was confirmed that the Libeau Descendants Society would charge an affiliation fee to the Rochefort- Akaroa Libeau Society of 50 Euro per year instead of individual membership.
- Bethel Clarke's work on the data base (Family Book) is now ready to put on the website. Need to work out the process to complete that, how it is to be maintained and recognition to Bethel Clarke for the work she has done.
- Need to review the website and consider options for additional information; e.g. photos of grave sites and further links being added. Now completed with more information to follow.
- Grant reported that our French Family were happy with our visit to France in 2007 and how it went. This has also been confirmed by the many e-mails received to this effect.
- Patricia to write to the Family thanking them for their hospitality during the reunion and to Bernard Grasset, Major of Rochefort for the hospitality received from the town.
- Lloyd Upton advised his wish to retire from the Society due to age and health. Patricia is to write to Lloyd thanking him for his service to the Society.
- We now need to look at other family graves that need to be refurbished. Of note:
 - Joseph Snr's grave. Some work was completed on this grave by Jessie Mould about 10 years ago. It needs a headstone with more information on it. Like to have this completed by 2011 (proposed visit by French Family).
 - Joseph Jnr's grave. It is noted that this one has collapsed and needs some repair work on it. It has been noted that the grave of Joseph Junior has been affected by the adjoining graves. Need to consult with other families to fix all the graves and source funding for it.
- The French Family have indicated that some of them intend to come to New Zealand to attend the World Rugby Cup in 2011.
- Need to consider, when opportunity presents itself, to publish articles in French and English.
- **From the Comte de Paris Society.**
- Series of Family based workshops this year.
- Two more trees have been planted in the Akaroa Heritage Park – for the LeLievre and de Malmanche families. Need to look at Affiliated Membership of our Society to the Comte de Paris Descendants Group
- Bereavement cards to the families of Hilda Clarke and Barrie McClymont
- Point was made at the AGM's that access to the whole website is by membership to the Society. The costs to maintain the website comes from subscriptions. Again a plea has been put out to provide articles and information for the website.
- NZ Historic Places Trust Application on Akaroa Family land sites. It is now realised that our requirement is to have an area of land to be recognised as of Historic interest as opposed to specific sections and buildings. This may not be as easy as envisaged as the NZ Historic Places Trust work on specific pieces of land and/or buildings.

 - French Fest – 11 & 12 Oct 08
 - Little River Trail – 23 Nov 08
